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





Begin to brainstorm - list what makes you, you - your strengths, skills and *competences (*often referred to in the world of work):

A strength is...an activity that makes you feel strong, excites you, energizes you. It's more than just something you're good at

A Skill is...something you can learn (and master) through repetition.

A Competence: refers to skills and knowledge while being more than just the skill or knowledge itself. It includes ability and behaviour.

A word about weaknesses: It is good to be self-aware. While we do not need to focus on our weaknesses all the time, it is important to be aware of areas you need to work on — is it time management? Or Teamwork? How can you improve on your weaknesses? Employers will be keen to know how you are working on your weaknesses too. Always seek to frame weaknesses in a positive way and let Employers know you are working on them, indicating how. Avoid saying that you are always late, etc. There is some great advice online about how to present your weaknesses.

A common interview question – Tell us about your strengths and weaknesses! Start preparing now, it will definitely help you.

TASK: Write down the skills/strengths you already have, and give examples. Also write those you would like to work toward or improve upon...

A few examples:

Subjects you are/were good at in school

- Where you achieve your best grades
- When you have achieved a clear outcome won a prize or commendation for a piece of work / artwork / written work, etc.
 - **An ability to communicate in another language**

A skill you have acquired in your spare time - at a school club, a local club/organisation or at home

- 🌟 learning to play a musical instrument
- ** achieving a badge as part of a Uniformed organisation, e.g. Scouts, Girls'/Boys' Brigade, Guides, Air Cadets, Sea Cadets, Army Cadets, Volunteer Police Cadets, etc.
- 🌟 Others tell you they love a particular dish you make, you're great at something particular
- ★You are able to fix and mend things bikes, computers, clothes
- Success within a sport within a team, competitively, or achieving a certain level e.g. different belts within Judo, School or Local Team, etc.

SECTION FOUR

Apprenticeships

This option enables you to gain work experience and earn a salary and gain a qualification. As with all options, if you would like to apply for an apprenticeship to begin after Year 13, it is a good idea to apply for a variety of back-up options (e.g. various levels of apprenticeship, jobs, and/or university) as entry to Apprenticeships can be competitive.

When applying - research the apprenticeship, the company and the qualification you will gain. Consider if/how the apprenticeship will enable you to go further in your education and training.

Each employer will share what they are looking for in an Apprentice. The subjects you took, and grades you achieved at Level 2 (GCSE) and Level 3 (A-Level or Level 3 BTEC) may be important, or the employer may be more focused on your skills, strengths and qualities. Requirements vary widely, so do research every Apprenticeship. Below is a rough guide for entry requirements: Here are the different levels of Apprenticeship:-

- Intermediate Apprenticeship A small number/range of GCSE grades may be required
- Advanced Apprenticeship 4+ GCSE's often at 4-9 grades required for entry
- Higher Apprenticeship 2+ 'A' levels or equivalent may be required for entry
- Degree Apprenticeship 2+ 'A' levels or equivalent may be required for entry

Each employer will indicate the skills, qualities, strengths and qualifications they are looking for- they will make decisions based on applications, assessments and interviews at various stages of the application process.*

Helpful Apprenticeship websites:

There is not currently one, go to website for Apprenticeships, so include a wide range of websites and resources in your searches. Start searching and applying for a number of opportunities during September of Year 13, onwards. Search regularly (e.g. weekly, every 2 weeks) and apply as soon as you can to ensure you do not miss great opportunities!...

the person specification (strengths, skills, qualifications & qualities required/preferred)

- 2) Tailor your skills to those the employer is looking for:
- provide evidence (e.g. of strengths, plus skills/transferable skills gained through study, work /voluntary experience and through your hobbies and extra-curricular activities
- 3) Show your interest, enthusiasm, and motivation towards the role and company tailor your application, CV and Cover Letter to each role you apply for this takes time, but pays off hugely!
- 4) Practice and then write/type your application (if applying online use Word and cut and paste)
- 5) Check for mistakes before submission
- 6) The more applications you work on and submit, the easier they become Following your application -

Prepare for interviews and assessments (e.g. online tests, group activities, etc.). Research what form assessments and interviews will take & prepare accordingly.

The time you take and effort you give to complete your - job, work experience, volunteering, gap year, or apprenticeship applications will be evident to employers - it can help you gain the opportunity of your dreams!


